The Governor of Uttar Pradesh, Mr. T V Rajeshwar will also inaugurate the newly constructed Dr B R Ambedkar Hall of

Residence for boys.

Mr. Rajeshwar will also attend the World Summit of AMU Alumni on 18th October 2008. The Vice President of India, Mr. M Hamid Ansari will be the Chief Guest. A large number of AMU Alumni from all over the world will be attending the two-day summit organized for the first time at Aligarh Muslim University.

SIX MEMBER COMMITTEE SUBMITTED ITS REPORT TO VC

ALIGARH, June 25- A six member committee constituted by the Executive Council today submitted its report to the Vice Chancellor of Aligarh Muslim University, Professor P.K. Abdul Azis.

The committee endorsed the proposal for the establishment of "Sir Syed International Centre for Advanced Study and Research at AMU.

The main objective of this proposed centre would be to promote creative thought in areas which have deeply human significance and to provide an environment suitable for academic research in all those aspects which were dear to the founder of the university, Sir Syed. To undertake, organize, guide and promote advanced research in selected subjects in Humanities. Social Sciences, Historical Studies, Theology, Indian Composite Culture, Evolution of Muslim Culture and Civilization, contribution of Muslims to national Freedom Movement, Secularism and Patriotism ,Comparative religion, Comparative languages and Literatures, Science and technology, Linguistic conflict in Modern Indian Languages, Contribution of Urdu literature to national resurgence and such other areas as the centre may, from time to time, decide.

The report highlighted the objectives of the Centre and mentioned that the Sir Syed International Centre would invite scholars from India and abroad to deliver lectures or conduct research and to collaborate with other academic institutions/bodies for the dissemination of knowledge and promotion of the objectives of the Centre. It is also suggested to institute fellowships and scholarships and such awards as may be decided by the Centre.

To meet the requirements and objectives of the proposed centre, it is envisaged that total amount of Rupees One crores in recurring and non-recurring is needed.

A six member committee was constituted by the Executive Council at its meeting held on October 4, 2005 under the convener ship of Prof Saiyed Jafar Reza. The other members were Prof. SAH Abidi, Mr Waseem Ahmad, Ex. M.P., Prof A. R. Khan, Prof Shan Mohammed and Dr. Sayed Mohammed Ahmad to examine the feasibility of the proposal for establishment of the proposal for establishment of an 'advanced Research Centre' named after Sir

Syed Ahmad Khan on the pattern of the Institute of Advanced Study, Shimla.

Professor Saiyed Jafar Reza, Professor Shan Mohammad and Dr. Sayed Mohammad Ahmad today presented the report. University Registrar, Professor V.K. Abdul Jalil was also present. AMU Vice Chancellor, Prof Azis appreciated the efforts of the Committee and assured that the University administration would take appropriate action.

PROF. SHAN MOHAMMED APPOINTED AS DIRECTOR OF THE SIR SYED ACADEMY

ALIGARH, June 26- Professor Shan Mohammed, D.Litt, an eminent scholar on the life and works of Sir Syed Ahmad Khan has been appointed as Hony. Director of the Sir Syed Academy with immediate effect for a period of two years or till further orders on usual terms and conditions.

Professor Shan Mohammed had served the University as Chairman, Department of Political science, Principal, Women's College and Director, Sir Syed Academy.

BURQA CLAD SUMIYA SCURED 12 MBBS MEDALS IN AMU

Two sparkling eyes popping out of traditional Muslim attire burqa (veil) got the attention of the former first citizen of India, Dr A.P.J.Abdul Kalam, Wipro Chief Mr Azim Premji and the audience as Sumaiya, a girl student with hijab got as many as 12 medals in the prestigious course MBBS at the 58th Annual convocation at the Aligarh Muslim University. Her magnificent feat indicates that Muslim girls are also advancing in the field of education. A female can pursue the studies of MBBS by wearing traditional Hijab (Burqa). Dr. Sumaiya says that hijab has never come on her way. Her homely atmosphere is religious, hence she adopted that. She had taken admission in class VIth in the AMU Girls High School. She was married to a doctor when she was doing MBBS and when she was preparing for final

year examinations, she gave birth to a child .Despite her responsibilities in the family, she remained busy with her studies and the end result is that she got the highest number of Medals. She got the medals in the convocation in which Former President of India, Dr A.P.J. Abdul Kalam has delivered the convocation address. The Aligarh Muslim University honored Dr Kalam and Wipro Chairman, Mr. Azim Premji with conferring D.Sc. (honoris causa).

This year 192 students were decorated with gold and silver medals for their academic performance. Female students performed much better as compared to their fellow boys' students. This convocation also signifies that education of girls is an important element within Muslim community and daughters of Muslims are craving for acquiring their status in the society with full energies and confidence. Eleven medals were awarded in the faculty of Science and all were bagged by girls.

In the Life Sciences faculty, no boys could register his name for medal. At the M.Sc and P.G. courses in the Life Science faculty, Kavita Parihar secured highest marks and got medal. At the graduate level, Atiyatul Qadeer, another girl from the same faculty topped the merit in all the courses.

In the Medicine faculty, girls bagged 22 out of total 24 medals. Dr. Sumaiya received the highest number of medals and beat all university records.

The first Annual Convocation of the Aligarh Muslim University was held on 28th December, 1922, degrees were conferred upon 75 graduates who had passed their examinations. The first Convocation address was delivered by Sultan Jahan Begum, ruler of Bhopal. She was elected the first Chancellor of the University in 1920, after receiving its charter as a University.

In the Commerce faculty, girls secured four out of five medals. In this faculty, a girl student Mariyam Mahtab got maximum marks in PG courses.

In the faculty of Engineering & Technology also Priya Agrawal received highest marks in all the branches and thus received university medal.

In the faculty of Law also Astha Singh bagged single medal by securing maximum marks in BA LLB examination. These medals signify the secular character of the Aligarh Muslim University. This year 51 non-Muslims received medals out of total 192 medals.

In the faculty of Science, Nida Khan received maximum marks while eleven medals out of eighteen were bagged by girls

In the social Science faculty, 21 medals were bagged by girls out of 28 medals. At the same time Syeda Naghba Tarannum in the Master and PG courses and Sadia Fatima in graduation received maximum marks. Two medals of theology faculty also went to girls. A single medal of the Unani Medicine faculty also went to Bushra Shahid. A total of 5482 degrees were awarded this year, out of which 2926 were under graduate, 1417 post graduates and 239 Ph.D. holders. Fifty five gold and one hundred forty two silver medals were given away at the Annual Convocation.

While presenting the annual report, AMU Vice Chancellor, Professor P.K.Abdul Azis said, "I have declared 2008 as a year for academic rejuvenation of the University. The goals set are clear". He further said some inspiring words, "I am dreaming the dawn of a new era for the AMU".

AMU INTENDS TO CONSTRUCT TWO NEW HOSTELS

ALIGARH, July 8: "The Aligarh Muslim University intends to construct two new hostels for students and it urged the Ministry of Human Resources to provide a grant of 48 crores", disclosed Professor P K Abdul Azis, Vice Chancellor who met Mr. Arjun Singh, Minister for Human Resource Development and other senior officials of the Ministry in Delhi.

The Vice Chancellor Professor P K Abdul Azis submitted a detailed development plan to the Minister. He also submitted a proposal for restoring and protecting "Heritage Buildings" of the University and for which 100 crore grant is sought.

Professor P K Abdul Azis also urged the Minister to provide the University with the list of visitor's nominees as early as possible so that the selection committees for teaching post could be held. The term of the Visitor's nominees has been expired six month ago and the University sent many reminders but in vain. The Secretary of the Ministry Mr. R P Agarwal informed the VC that the Ministry has already put the file before the Visitor and the Visitor's approval is awaited. The Minister of Human Resources Development Mr. Arjun Singh assured the VC to expedite the matter relating to the

appointment of the Visitor's Nominee.

AMU FELICITATES MERITORIOUS STUDENTS

Aligarh: The Aligarh Muslim University (AMU) City Girls High School organized a program for the disbursement of merit scholarships to students who secured high percentage of marks in the 2007-08 academic session.

Prof. V.K. Abdul Jaleel, Registrar of the varsity and the manager of the University Schools, was the chief guest on the occasion.

Prof. Jaleel awarded students for their creative work. He boosted up the moral of students and teachers as well in his speech.

Prof. Jaleel said, "I am satisfied with the working of the Principal and staff members. The standard of the school is better then ever before."

He also encouraged students and teachers of the school to work towards maintaining high standards in both education and extra-curricular activities.

He also recognized some students who stood winners in the other function of the University as he was present in those programs.

AMUOBA ACTIVITIES HIGHLIGHTED AT GENERAL BODY MEETING

KARACHI, Sept 1 (APP): General Secretary, Aligarh Muslim University Old Boys Association, Engr Zakir Ali Khan has said that despite all odds and difficulties, Sir Syed University of Engineering and Technology (SSUET), a unique institution of AMUOBA is traversing the stages of development.

Presenting his report at the Annual General Body meeting of AMUOBA for the year 2007-08 held under the chairmanship of Z.A. Nizami, the President, Zakir Ali Khan lamented that certain members are involved in inimical propaganda and it warrants that

necessary statistics and details should be presented for information of everyone.

He said that during the last one year, not only the number of male and female students has increased but there had been a significant increase in the number of highly qualified teachers as well while new technologies introduced and MS and Ph.D facilities in new subjects started.

He informed that SSUET has concluded agreements with foreign universities among which University of Hertford Shire, Conventory University and London Metropolitan University, all in UK, were on the top.

He said a major source of delight was that after detail reviews the Higher Education Commission awarded top grade to the University after it was satisfied with its academic standards, financial stability, discipline etc.

Zakir Ali Khan said that as against 1164 students who obtained admission in the university in 2006-2007, 1292 students were given admission in 2007-2008 while number of teachers rose from 203 in 2006- 07 to 240 in 2007-08 and Ph.Ds from 13 to 15.

He said the University's 11th convocation was held on March 29, 2008 in which Chancellor Z.A. Nizami presented degrees to 983 MS and BS students besides presenting medals to various position holders.

During 2007, he said the medals given included 6 gold, 5 silver and 5 bronze and as many medals during 2008.

He pointed out that University's budget showed a significant increase from Rs 470 million in 2007-08 to Rs 520 million in 2008-09 while amount for scholarships raised from over Rs 19 million to over Rs 27 million. He said no other institution extends such financial help to students anywhere in Pakistan.

He referred to working of career planning and placement bureau and said this keeps liaison with multi-national companies and various organizations and thousands of students have benefitted with its services.

Zakir Ali Khan informed that in the budget 2007-08, Rs 10 million had been earmarked for development works of IT park while Rs 6 million kept aside in the budget 2008-09 for the purpose.

He dilated upon Association's literacy activities which includes the publication of journal Tehzibul Ikhlāq, publication of a number of books holding of Eid Milad function Sir Sved Dav mushairas

participation in debates and sports outside Karachi.

He also informed the General Body about Sir Syed Tower project of AMUOBA and said tenders have been invited, and a committee formed for their evaluation. He said the lowest tender is for Rs 760 million which does not include the cost of electricity.

Zakir Ali Khan said Aligarh Institute of technology is also continuously heading towards progress and the number of students have increased from 1330 in 2006-07 to 1389 in 2007-08.

TRIBUTE TO 108-YEAR-OLD ALIGARH STUDENT

KARACHI: The Sir Syed University of Engineering and Technology (SSUET) Chancellor Z.A. Nizami, along with a delegation of the Aligarh Muslim University Old Boys Association (AMUOBA) met Nisar Ahmed Khan, a 108-year-old ex student of the Aligarh Muslim University (AMU). The delegation announced that the AMUOBA, in collaboration with the SSUET, will be honoring the legendary Aligarhian on his birthday on September 29.

Nisar Ahmed Khan was born in Ghaziabad, Uttar Pradesh in 1901 and completed his Bachelors in Science from the AMU in 1927. He then went to the US for further education and before Pakistan had come into being, was appointed as the Uttar Pradesh Agriculture Director, with a posting in Rampur.

Khan is the oldest living student of AMU who participated in

the silver jubilee celebrations of the university in 1925 and had the opportunity to meet many influential leaders, including Maulana Mohammed Ali Jauhar, Maharaja Mahmoodabad and Nawab Muzammal Khan. Post partition, he served in several positions in the agriculture department of Dhaka.

PROF. MUZAFFAR MIR OF SKIMS HONOURED IN US

Srinagar, July 20: Research work being carried out at the Sher-i-Kashmir Institute of Medical Sciences (SKIMS), Soura is being recognized and appreciated at the international level. Dr M Muzaffar Mir, Head, Department of Clinical Biochemistry has been chosen as the recipient of an 'International Research Grant' of 60 thousand US dollars in recognition of his research work being carried out at SKIMS in the fields of 'Cancer biology and cell cycle regulation.'

Dr. Mir's research paper entitled "Combined impact of polymorphism of folate metabolism genes; glutamate carboxypeptidase, methylene tetrahydrofolate reductase and methionine synthase reductase on breast cancer susceptibility in Kashmiri women" has been judged as one of the ten 10 papers being presented at American Association of Clinical chemistry (AACC) annual meeting to be held in last week of July, 2008 at the Washington Convention Center. Ten such grants have been sanctioned worldwide and Dr Mir is the only scientist from India to receive this grant. He completed his Maters in Biochemistry from the University of Kashmir as a student of first batch in 1983 and did his M Phil and PhD in Biochemistry from the faculty of Medicine, AMU Aligarh in 1989.

MUSLIMS MUST FOCUS ON SCHOOL EDUCATION

If Muslims wait another five or 10 years, they are going to

lose millions of children.

Sixty years after independence, with 40 per cent of its population under 18, the community is now confronting the perils of its failure to educate Muslims, notably the poor.

If Muslims continue their apathy for another five or 10 years, they are going to lose millions of children to illiteracy. No doubt more Muslim children are in school than ever before, but the quality of Muslim managed schools has sunk to extremely low levels, as government schools have become reserves of children at the very bottom of the social ladder.

The children in Muslim managed schools come from the poorest of families, who can't afford to send them their young ones to other schools.

Indian Muslim community is now confronting the perils of its failure to educate Muslims, notably the poor. Muslims in India have a long legacy of weak schooling, even as they have promoted higher education.

A cursory look at the Muslim managed schools reveals that while more children were sitting in class, vast numbers of them could not read, write or perform basic arithmetic, to say nothing of those who were not in school at all.

Education experts debate the reasons for failure. Some point out that children of illiterate parents are less likely to get help at home; the Trends Research and Analysis Centre (TRAC) survey shows that the child of a literate woman performs better at school. Others blame longstanding neglect, insufficient public financing and accountability, and a lack of motivation among some teachers, to pay special attention to poor children from lower castes.

Education is a long-term investment. Muslim community has neglected it, quite criminally, for an enormously long period of time.

Education in modern India has become a crucial marker of inequality. Among the poorest 20 per cent of the Muslim population, half are illiterate, and less than 2 per cent graduate from high school, according to Census data. By contrast, among the richest 20 per cent of the Muslim

population, nearly half are high school graduates and only 2 per cent are illiterate. Just as important, at a time when only one in 10 college-age Indians actually go to college, higher education has become the most effective way to scale the golden ladder of the new economy.

What are the remedies? we at the mohalla level of our Muslim community should:

1. Increase Enrolment: Recruit unemployed Muslims and pay them to recruit children who have never been to school.

2. Mohalla education committee: Identify Muslim majority localities and form Mohalla education committee with a brief to keep the school and its principal accountable to the community.

3. Raise finance locally and spend it on local schools. TRAC survey reveals that the participation of parents and local Muslims in enhancing the facilities in local schools is very dismal. Unless and until local Muslims get involved in providing the basic infrastructure and monitor the quality of education imparted to children in schools, the level of education cannot be ensured.

4. Making school committees accountable using RTI: School committee is a statutory body. TRAC survey reveals that with few exceptions, school committees are not justifying their role. Using Right to Information, local Muslims must build pressure on school committees so that they are more proactive and take care of infrastructure and quality of education issues.

5. Feedback on teachers' performance through strengthening parents' teachers association: One of the major issues is the laidback attitude of the teachers since they are permanent employees they take everything for granted. Only local Muslims, by strengthening the parents' teacher association and making it proactive, can apply pressure on teachers to perform on quality education parameters.

More serious issues like absent or corrupt teachers, low quality of instruction, building repairs and new construction required, cannot be handled directly by children. So parents' teachers association should interact with children

directly and launch their school-improving activities.

6. Removing the apathy of Muslim parents: The reason for parents' apathy is not only the intense pressure of poverty, which is serious enough, but people's firm belief that schools and education is the business of the government. If a child failed in a class, the parents would simply assume that the child 'did not have brains', cuff him over the head and send him to work. Local Muslims should conduct parent workshop to keep them informed on various issues and also educate them.

7. Organizing children forums fortnightly: It's always better to hear from children to know more about their problems both at home and schools. Children forums can be used for mobilising parents, obtain information about what was going on in school and homes and so on.

8. Making school worth going to: TRAC survey reveals that the most important reason why dropouts happen - more important than even poverty - that school is simply not worth the trouble.

Parents today are aware of the importance of education as never before. Even the poorest parents send their children to school if the state provides free education. Often in the process, the family has to lose vital income. But if this parent finds that after four years of schooling, the child can't even write his name, then he has every reason to withdraw the child from school and put him to more remunerative work. On their part, children too are not keen to go to school if the school is shoddy or is not run efficiently.

9. Ensuring the participation of children in making their classroom and school worth going daily: To improve the condition of classrooms, the school and the quality of education, the children need to be first motivated to do voluntary work. The duty of cleaning the school compound should be assigned to students. Children should be motivated to plant saplings around the schools and also start kitchen gardens. The funds generated should be reserved for school improvement. Working with limited funds, children should be coached to make simple educational aids and decorate each classroom so that the atmosphere changes from dreary to colorful and inspiring
